You are Kate.

You are = You're

She is Ann.

She is = She's

He is Ben.

GRAMMAR



(-) TO BE

I am not Liz.

I am not = I'm not

You are not Kate.

You are not = You aren't

She is not Ann.

She is not = She isn't

He is not Ben.

He is not = He isn't

GRAMMAR



(?) TO BE

Are you Kate?

+ Yes, I am.

- No, I am not. No, I'm not.

Is she Ann?

+ Yes, she is.

- No, she is not. No, she isn't.

Is he Ben?

+ Yes, he is.

- No, he is not. No, he isn't.

HAVE GOT

I have got a sister.

I've got a sister.

You have got a sister.

You've got a sister.

We have got a sister.

HAS GOT

She has got a sister.

GRAMMAR

HASN'T GOT

She has not got a sister.

She hasn't got a sister.

He has not got a sister.

He hasn't got a sister.





GRAMMAR

(?) HAVE GOT

Have you got a sister?

+ Yes, I have.

- No, I have not. No, I haven't.

Have we got a sister?

+ Yes, we have.

- No, we have not. No, you haven't.

Have they got a sister?

+ Yes, they have.

- No, they have not. No, they haven't.

GRAMMAR

(?) HAS GOT

Has she got a sister?

+ Yes, she has.

- No, she has not. No, she hasn't.

Has he got a sister?

+ Yes, he has.

- No, he has not. No, he hasn't.



GRAMMAR



(+) Present Simple

I like Ann.

You like Ann.

He likes Ann.

She likes Ann.

We like Ann.

They like Ann.

GRAMMAR



(-) Present Simple

I do not (don't) like Ann.

You do not (don't) like Ann.

He does not (doesn't) like Ann.

She does not (doesn't) like Ann.

We do not (don't) like Ann.

They do not (don't) like Ann.

GRAMMAR



(?) Present Simple

Do you like Ann?

+ Yes, I do.

- No, I do not. = No, I don't.

Do they like Ann?

+ Yes, they do.

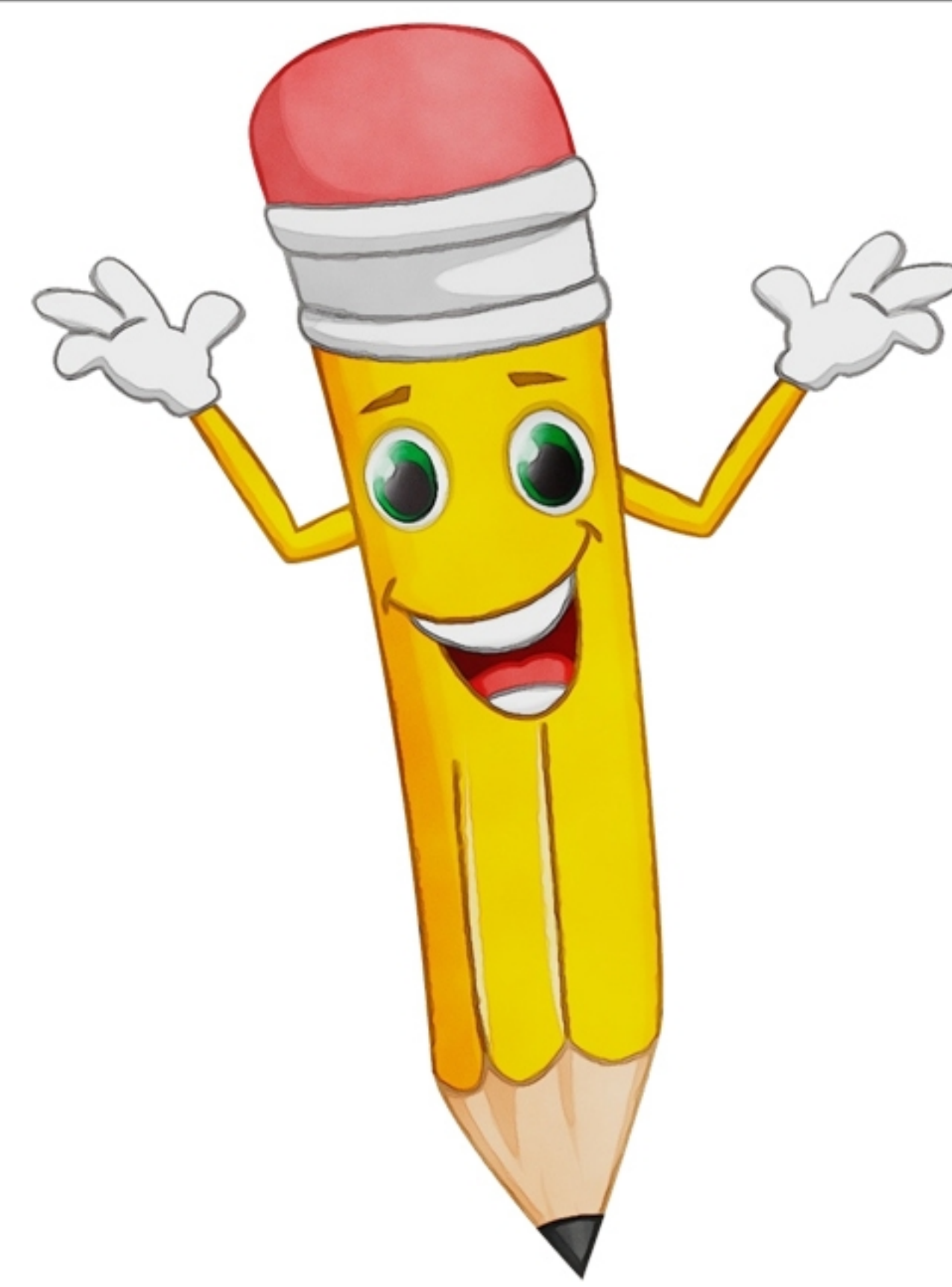
- No, they do not. = No, they don't.

Do we like Ann?

+ Yes, we do.

- No, we do not. = No, we don't.

Does he like Ann?

+ Yes, he does.

- No, he does not.

= No, he doesn't.

Does she like Ann?

+ Yes, she does.

- No, she does not.

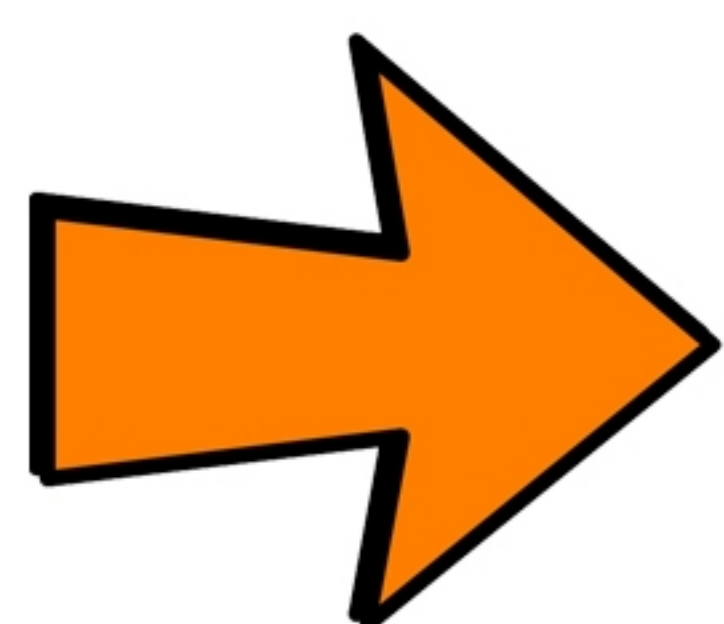
= No, she doesn't.

GRAMMAR

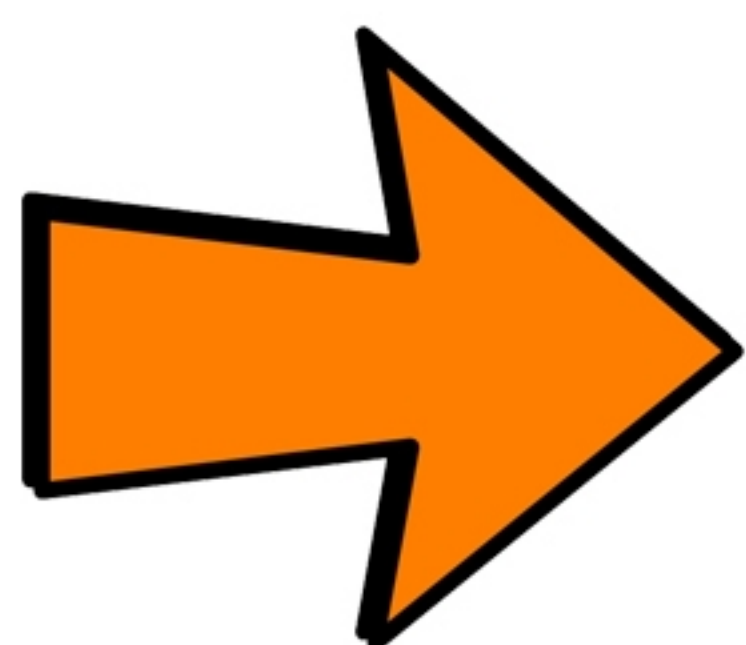
This- These - That - Those

That is or Those are to talk about things or people that aren't near us.



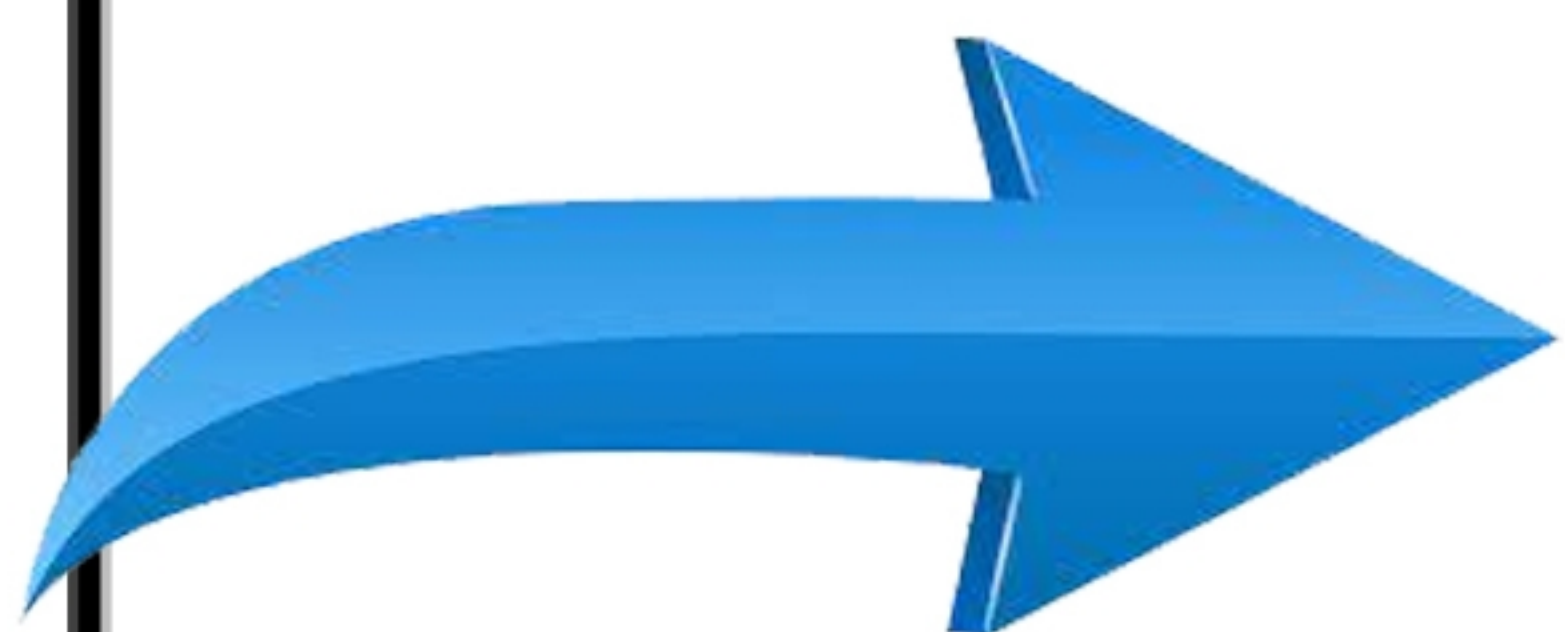
This is a cat.

Can he jump? Yes, he can.

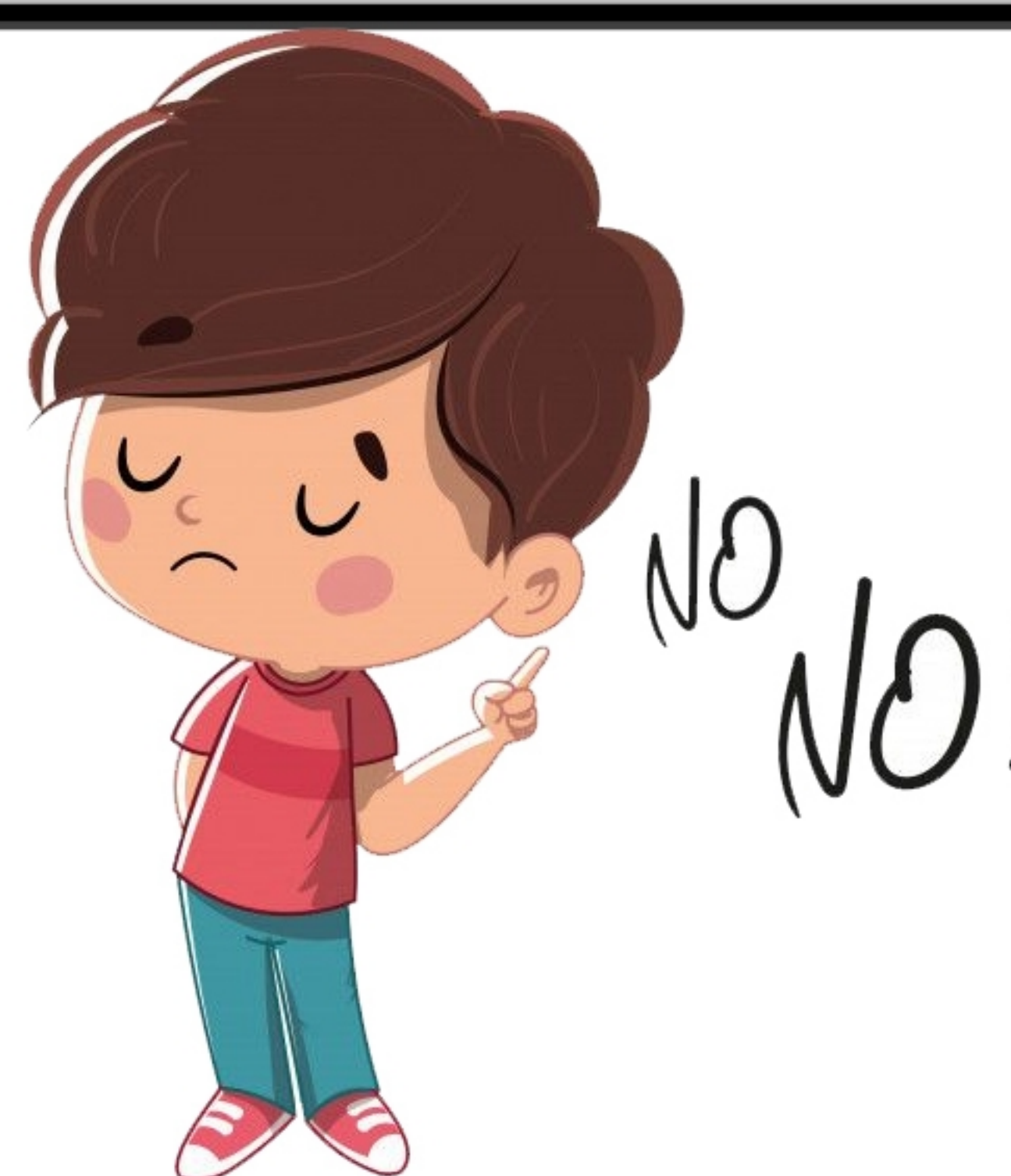
